



Parks and Recreation Board Awards Grants to Local Programs

In April the City of Wilsonville's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board awarded grants to support community programs with funding from the City's Opportunity Grant program. In all, four different local organizations were awarded \$11,380 in grants:

- **WilsonvilleStage**—Purchase of new lighting and sound equipment: \$7,000
- **Trillium Creek Training and Rehab**—T-Shirts and a toilet: \$2,630
- **WLWV School District** — Five Wilsonville Robotics scholarships: \$1,000
- **Wilsonville Pickleball Club**—Tournament related expenses: \$750

The Opportunity Grant program is funded by the City's general fund to assist local individuals and organizations that further educational or artistic opportunities; encourage and foster diversity; foster advances in education, art or community leadership; or involve youth or elderly population in community activities. A total of \$25,000 is made available each year, with deadlines in October and March.

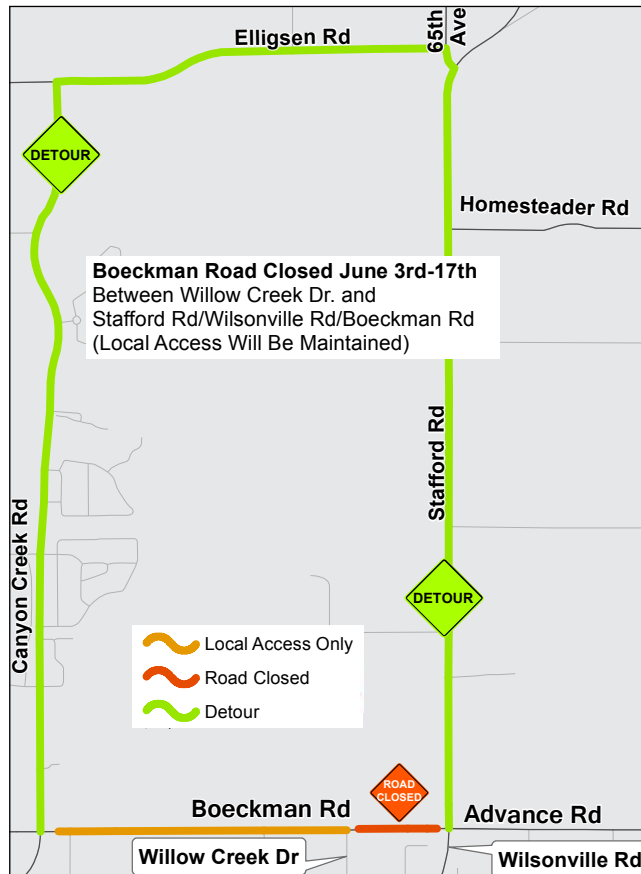

Boeckman Road Closures Needed to Make Improvements

Boeckman Road between Wilsonville Road and Willow Creek Drive will be closed to all through-traffic for a two-week period, Saturday, June 3, until Saturday, June 17. The intersection at Wilsonville and Stafford Roads will remain open for north- and southbound traffic. Local access to homeowners along Boeckman is being maintained, but short delays are expected.

The closure is needed to allow complete reconstruction of a section of the roadway in association with the new Meridian Creek Middle School being constructed by the West Linn–Wilsonville School District.

A detour route using Canyon Creek, Elligsen, and Stafford roads is in place throughout construction. The City and School District apologize for any inconvenience this may cause citizens and businesses.

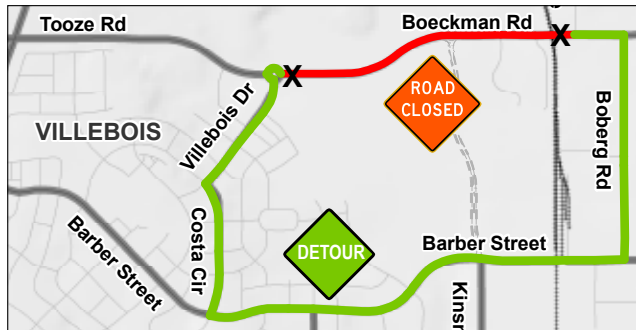

Kinsman Road Extension

Construction of the Kinsman Road extension project that connects SW Boeckman Road and Barber Street has required a closure of Boeckman Road, west of 95th Avenue and east of Villebois Drive, lasting until early August. The closure is required to build a concrete roundabout at the new intersection of Boeckman and Kinsman Roads. A detour route along Boberg Road, Barber Street, Costa Circle and Villebois Drive is in place.



Boeckman Road, west of 95th and east of Villebois Drive, is closed until early August except for local business traffic.

Our History: Modoc Makes Regular Stops at Boone's Landing

The Modoc, a 142-foot-long steamer built in 1889, made regular stops at Boone's Landing as part of the ship's route that ran from Dayton, down through the Willamette Falls Locks to Portland in the late 1800s to the early 1900s.

Time to Register for Fall Recreational Soccer and Summer Camps

Willamette United Football Club (WUFC), formerly known as Willamette United Soccer Club, is accepting online registrations for kids to play fall soccer and for summer camps. Generally players registered by June 15 get an early-bird discount.

Parents are strongly encouraged to register as early as possible to ensure a spot for their child on a team.

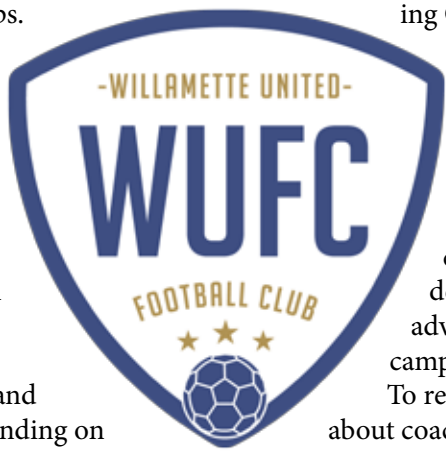
WUFC offers teams for boys and girls in grades kindergarten to eighth grade, as well as, coed teams for high school-aged soccer players.

Fall practices begin in late August and are held one to two days a week depending on the child's age. Games begin Saturday, Sept. 9 and

end Oct. 28 for most teams. Kindergarten–2nd grade teams play in West Linn or Wilsonville and older ages play on local fields or in the surrounding areas including Clackamas, Lake Oswego, Oregon City, Tigard and West Linn.

The non-profit soccer club's recreational and coed high school programs rely on parent volunteer coaches and offers support to new coaches through free coaching clinics. The club also offers a player development program, club soccer for advanced players, and summer soccer camps for players of all ages and abilities.

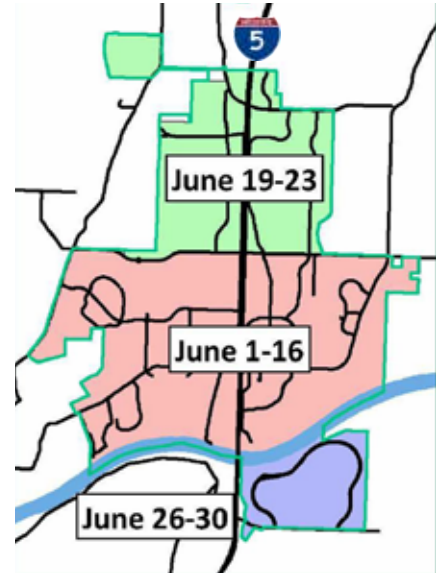
Water Mains Get "Spring Cleaning" with Hydrant Flushing

Every year Wilsonville's utilities crew flush the City's water mains to remove naturally occurring mineral deposits from the pipes. Annual flushing ensures optimal water quality for Wilsonville's residents and helps to maintain the infrastructure by exercising hydrants, valves and blow-off assemblies during the flushing process.

When the utilities crew is flushing in your area, you may also observe that the water in your home or the water coming out of a nearby hydrant appears to have an orange or rust-colored tint. This is a normal occurrence and the water is completely safe.

The discoloration is caused by iron deposits in the pipes that are scoured-out during flushing. If you observe discolored water in your home, simply run your COLD water for several minutes to clear your lines and flush your toilets once or twice. The water should run clear again within a few minutes.

If you observe a utility crew flushing in your area, make sure to give them plenty of room to work safely while sharing the roadway. Also, be aware that some flushing activities will take place at night to minimize traffic congestion. If you have any questions or concerns regarding the City's annual water main flushing program, please call the Public Works Department at 503-570-4092.

Business License Renewals and Fees Due By June 30

The City of Wilsonville's Business License renewal period occurs during the month of June as all business licenses issued by the City expire on June 30 each year. To expedite business license renewals the City mails renewal application forms to all currently licensed businesses starting the first week of June.

Renewing a business license is an easy three-step process:

1. Complete the information at the top of the form.
2. Calculate the amount due according to the fee schedule.
3. Insert the signed and dated form with the fee in the return envelope and mail back or place in the drop box at City Hall.

When the renewal application is processed a new business license is issued and is mailed to the business to be displayed.

To maintain the quality of life in the parks, alcoholic beverages are not allowed, other than for pre-approved events and reservations. Additionally, smoking is prohibited in all parks, as well as dogs off-leash except in approved off-leash areas.

Child Safety

During the summer please take extra caution as you drive through our residential areas and around town as more kids are out playing, riding bikes, taking walks and just being kids. Remember that proper supervision of children in the summer is especially important. Summer activities such as swimming, cycling and other outings can present dangers that our children might not recognize. Regardless of their age, I encourage parents to talk with their children about what their expectations are for safe behavior and specific risks



that should be avoided. Additionally, children should be supervised in a manner appropriate to their age, maturity and the risks inherent in the activity. Many activities have protective equipment that is required by law. For example, boating with children requires that they wear an approved personal flotation device (PFD). Cycling requires use of a helmet by law. Consider other activities where helmets and protective gear are not mandated but can definitely reduce the dangers of an activity.

Curfew

While many other cities have more restrictive curfew hours, the City of Wilsonville follows state statute which includes the hours between midnight and 4 am. If a child is found out in public during curfew hours without a parent or guardian in their company and the minor is not engaged in a lawful activity that requires that they be in the public place at that time, the minor is in violation of ORS 419C.680. For the safety and security of that child, he or she must be taken into protective custody by police.

Contacting the Police

Any time you are in need of police, fire or medical response, you should do so in the way that will produce the best possible response. If you are experiencing or witnessing an emergency or a crime in progress, call 911. However, in cases of non-emergency situations that require the services of a police officer, call the City's non-emergency dispatch line at 503-655-8211.

If you would like an officer to stop by a neighborhood barbecue, youth camp, or other local event this summer, we would be happy to participate if possible. To schedule a visit from one of our officers call our non-emergency dispatch number, 503-655-8211, to make arrangements.

I hope these tips and reminders help ensure you have a great and worry-free summer. However, if something does arise, please know the Wilsonville Police Department is always here to help any time of the day or night. I hope you and your family have a safe and fun summer.

Reports from City Boards and Commissions

City Council Approves New Community Enhancement Projects and Mayor Declares May 21–27 as Public Works Week

At the May 15 Wilsonville City Council meeting, the Council adopted the project funding recommendations made by the Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Committee to advance seven projects that total just over \$100,000, including: Art and Culture Survey and Strategic Plan (\$26,100); Beauty and the Bridge Interpretive Signs (\$20,000); Graham Oaks Nature Park Pedestrian Crossing Safety Enhancement (\$20,000); Electronic Reader Board and Wilsonville Public Library Sign (\$15,000); Beauty and the Bridge Lighting Feasibility Study (\$10,000); Community Health Fair (\$5,000); and Clackamas Community College Permanent Public Art Installation (\$4,000). The approved projects are expected to begin on or after July 1 and to be completed within a two-year time frame. Funded by a fee on biodegradable solid-waste transferred at the facilities of Republic Services in Wilsonville, the new Community Enhancement Program can underwrite a wide range of projects and programs that benefit the community. In December 2017 the City will begin accepting new online project nominations to be considered for the 2018-19 program funding.

Under Mayor's Business, the Mayor proclaimed the week of May 21–27 as Public Works Week to acknowl-

edge the contributions of the City's Public Works staff and investments. The City's Public Works Department is composed of 20 professionals who are responsible for maintaining city facilities, city-owned streets, landscaping, street trees, the water distribution system, the stormwater and sanitary sewer systems, along with management and oversight of the water and the wastewater treatment plants.

Under Communications, the City Council received an update on the five projects that previously received funding from the 2016-17 Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Program. Finally, Police Chief Adam Phillips provided the City Council an annual report regarding the efforts and outcomes of the Wilsonville Police department for calendar year 2016; a copy of the report is available at www.ci.wilsonville.or.us/police.

During work session prior to the meeting, the City Council and the Planning Commission held a joint meeting regarding the Wilsonville Town Center Plan to review and provide input on overall vision, goals and for the 18-month long-range planning project. City Council approved over \$100,000 in Community Enhancement Projects, including installing interpretive signage and completing a lighting feasibility study for the Beauty and the Bridge art project that runs under I-5 along Wilsonville Road.

City Council Declares Wilsonville as an Inclusive City and Approves Water Pipeline Ground Lease and Other Agreements

At the May 1 Wilsonville City Council meeting, the Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 2626 declaring the City of Wilsonville as a welcoming and inclusive city. Specifically the resolution states, "The City of Wilsonville is an inclusive City that has and will continue to welcome the collective contributions of all persons, honoring and respecting people of every race, color, national origin, immigration or refugee status, heritage, culture, religion, sex, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, marital status, mental and/or physical ability, age, or economic status." The resolution continues, "The Wilsonville City Council encourages all Wilsonville residents to unite and work together to promote kindness and understanding in

our shared community, rejecting hatred, bigotry, and divisiveness, as this community strives to protect the freedoms held dear and granted to all by the United States Constitution. While this City Council may pass this inclusivity resolution in the hope that it is inspirational, the only true measure of its success will be in how all members of the community elect to treat each other day in and day out." The full resolution is available on the City's website in English and Spanish.

The City Council also contingently approved a 99-year ground lease and two related agreements that allow a six-foot-diameter raw water pipeline, which serves a new Tualatin Valley Water District (TVWD) and the City of Hillsboro water treatment plant, to run through approximately three miles of the City's public right-of-way and other City property.

The pipeline provides water from the Willamette River intake facility in Wilsonville to Hillsboro, and potentially other cities in Washington County. The approved lease and related agreements specify the

total amount and types of compensation the City is to receive, including ground rent, seismic upgrades around the water treatment plant and intake facility, and several public right-of-way infrastructure improvements that TVWD will provide as a part of the pipeline construction. The agreements also designate Wilsonville as the manager of the current Wilsonville plant that is jointly owned by TVWD and Wilsonville, and also serves the City of Sherwood. The agreements also provide for upgrades to the intake facility that will provide Wilsonville with additional capacity. The approvals are contingent upon the City Council's acceptance of a final intergovernmental intake agreement that governs the volume of water each party can draw from the Willamette River.

In Wilsonville the pipeline route runs north from the water treatment plant north on Kinsman Road and 95th Avenue, west on Ridder Road and then north on Garden Acres Road. A portion of the pipeline is now under construction as part of the Kinsman Road extension project between Barber St. and Boeckman Road, while the other segments to be constructed in Wilsonville are over the next five years and prior to the pipeline's completion in 2026. Under Communications, staff of Republic Services, Wilsonville's waste hauler and recycler, presented an annual Wilsonville community garbage and recycling report. The City Council also heard a report regarding a plan to combine the City's annual neighborhood barbecue events into a single-event open to all community members to be held at Town Center Park in August in conjunction with the Wilsonville Town Center Master Plan.

During work session prior to the meeting, the City Council heard reports regarding the potential use of red-light camera systems and diversion program for youth and adults; an update on the Basalt Creek Concept Plan; transit funding; and the French Prairie Bridge evaluation criteria.

Planning Commission Update

At the Planning Commission meeting on May 10, the Commission held a public hearing regarding the Transit Master Plan and recommended the plan for City Council adoption on June 5 (see related article on pg. 2). On May 15 the Commission participated in a joint meeting with City Council to discuss the vision and goals for the Wilsonville Town Center Plan.

Development Review Board Update

At the DRB Panel B meeting on Monday, May 22, the Board reviewed an application from the West-Linn Wilsonville School District for an electronic reader board to be placed at Wilsonville High School (see City website for results).

Parks & Rec Wants to Hear from Community Members

The City's Parks & Recreation Department is currently developing a long-range master plan to guide the City's investment in recreational programs, parks facilities, and community services to offer.

As part of the plan the department is conducting both a written and online survey to solicit feedback from local residents. The printed survey was mailed to 3,500 households in May and an online survey is opening on Thursday, June 8 to obtain additional community feedback. To help develop the plan the City hired GreenPlay, LLC, a national firm based in Colorado with extensive experience across the U.S. facilitating, researching and developing similar parks and recreation master plans

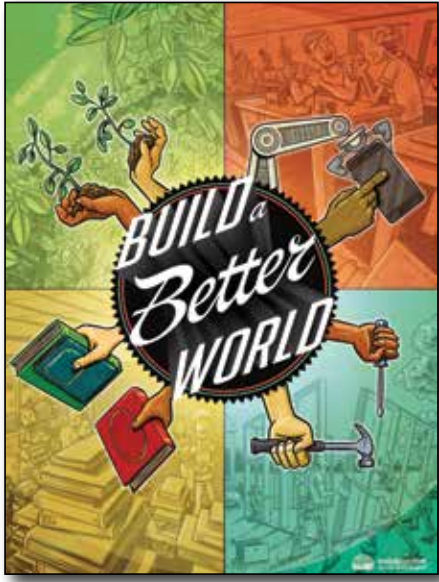

Here are the Cultural Pass Program rules:

- \$5 late charge per day - up to the cost of the pass, starting at library opening time the first day it is late
- All pass privileges will be lost until charges are paid
- Any reserved pass not picked up by 1 p.m. on date of reservation will be considered cancelled and

made available for others

- Borrowers must be 18 years of age or older with a LINCC card in good standing
- Charge for a lost pass is the actual replacement cost of the pass
- If the day of use is a closed day for the library you may return the pass in the book drop before library opening on the next day of business
- Loan is for one day, and cannot be renewed
- Pass must be returned only to the library from which it was borrowed, and in person to the Circulation Desk
- Pass must be returned on the day used at least one hour before closing (to allow for the next patron to pick up before closing)
- Reservations may be made in person or by phoning the library
- Reserved passes are available for pickup one hour before closing on the night prior to the intended day of use
- The number of persons admitted to a particular venue will vary. Call the Library for specific admission information not contained on the pass.
- Up to two passes per day may be checked out on your library card
- Passes may not be reserved for two consecutive days.

TVF&R Offers Tips to Prevent Window Falls

As we welcome warmer summer weather, Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue reminds parents, grandparents, and baby sitters that window falls are preventable.

Each year, window falls account for about eight deaths and more than 3,300 injuries to young children in the United States. In Oregon, 26 children ages five and younger fell from windows in 2016.

TVF&R firefighter paramedics responded to an incident last May involving a three-year-old boy who fell from a second-floor window of his Tigard home. The child was transported to an area hospital for injuries he sustained when he landed on a concrete sidewalk after pushing out a window screen.

Window screens are not strong enough to keep a child from falling out of a window. They are designed to keep bugs out, not kids in.

Because children frequently land on their heads, many require hospitalization for fall injuries and may have permanent disabilities. A majority of falls occur between May and September, but can happen anytime windows are open.

The encouraging news is that simple steps can help prevent injuries. As a partner in the Stop at 4 Inches Campaign to Prevent Window Falls, TVF&R urges parents and families to continue their commitment to window safety.

Please share the following tips with friends, family, or anyone else who has children living in or visiting their home.

- Keep windows closed and locked when not in use.
- Keep furniture and anything a child can climb on away from windows.
- Do not open windows more than 4 inches and install window stops. Window stops prevent windows from opening wide enough to allow a child to tumble out.



- Window stops should be easily removed by an adult in the event of a fire or other emergency, as windows serve as a secondary means of escape.
- For a double-hung window, open the top portion near the ceiling for ventilation while keeping the bottom portion closed.
- Actively watch children near windows — no device can replace adult supervision. Encourage children to keep a safe distance away from windows.
- Ask about window safety when your child visits other homes.
