Town Center 'Design Concept' Draft Available for Review, Input

City representatives and Town Center Task Force members introduced a draft of the Community's Design Concept for Wilsonville Town Center to about 50 community members at a February open house.

Participants had an opportunity to engage with the project team by asking questions and contributing their ideas to the community's concept, which is a reflection of the public input received throughout the past year of the project.

"We've been fortunate, at every public event, to have so many thoughtful, engaged community members contributing insight and ideas," said Miranda Bateschell, planning manager. "We appreciate the enthusiastic response, and recognize that it will help us deliver a plan that the community will support."

The building blocks of the Community Design Concept include land use, connectivity and green space, and participants discussed all three with project team members, friends and neighbors. Open house attendees expressed continued enthusiasm for a Main Street, safe pedestrian and cyclist connections, and a

variety of new mixed-use buildings and other amenities including outdoor gathering spaces and green spaces; they also expressed interest in the details of the transportation network and potential traffic.



Community input from this open house as well as previous and on-going community events, surveys, and stakeholder meetings will guide the development of a draft Wilsonville Town Center Plan. The final plan will set the framework for future development within Town Center to achieve the community's vision for a vibrant, walkable destination that inspires people to

come together to live, work and play in the heart of Wilsonville.

Help Us Lead Effectively By Letting Your Voice Be Heard

The City of Wilsonville is actively working to improve the quality of life and community amenities available to residents, employees and visitors. We achieve our best results when we have active engagement by the community to provide public feedback on proposed solutions.



Two topics that we have been discussing a great deal over the past year include redevelopment opportunities for our Town Center area and local-area transportation improvements. Several open-house events and public-feedback surveys are scheduled for March and April that I want to call your attention to. Please take advantage of these occasions as you can to let us know your thoughts.

• **Town Center Plan Open House:** The online survey for public input on the draft "Community Design Concept" for the Town Center Plan project has been extended to March 5. We want to hear your views for a proposal that seeks to create a more walkable Town Center, increase small-business retail opportunities and provide more restaurant options, including outdoor dining.

The City is hosting a second Town Center open-house event, in Spanish, on March 1. • **Southbound I-5 Boone Bridge Congestion Study:** The Oregon Dept. of Transportation (ODOT) and City are working on a study of the southbound I-5 traffic congestion problem that impacts Wilsonville Road and other city arterials. This "ramp-to-ramp" study—from the Wilsonville

Road I-5 on-ramp to the Highway 551 I-5 off-ramp—seeks to understand which kinds of road changes could improve traffic congestion and provide initial cost estimates for various options. The March 14 open house provides a great opportunity to learn about proposed roadway modifications, interact with staff and traffic engineers and provide your input. See page 2 for more details.

• **5th Street to Kinsman Road Extension Open House:** This project, formerly known as the "Old Town Escape," extends 5th Street in Old Town across Arrowhead Creek to connect with Kinsman Road. This road project, which includes sidewalks and bike lanes, provides another route in and out of Old Town area, including the Old Town Square shopping center anchored by the Fred Meyer store. City, ODOT to Introduce New Boone Bridge “Ramp-to-Ramp” Lane Solution

March 14 Open House To Detail Three Options That Would Relieve Congestion, Improve Safety of Southbound I-5

Wilsonville and Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), studying solutions to improve traffic flow and reduce southbound congestion on the I-5 Boone Bridge, will introduce a “ramp-to-ramp” (i.e. auxiliary) lane concept at an Open House at City

Hall on Wednesday, March 14, at 5 pm.

Recent traffic flow analysis indicates that about 60 per-

cent of all traffic entering I-5 at Wilsonville Rd. exits at either the Charbonneau or Canby-Hubbard exits. A ramp-to-ramp lane would alleviate congestion and make lane changes easier, yielding a safer stretch of road and more reliable commute times. Similar projects in the Portland region have reduced crashes by 30-50 percent, according to ODOT.

At the open house, the project team will share the results of the Southbound I-5 Boone Bridge Congestion Study, completed to determine how to help mitigate daily congestion over the bridge. It will also gather community input about the three ramp-to-ramp alternatives under consideration:

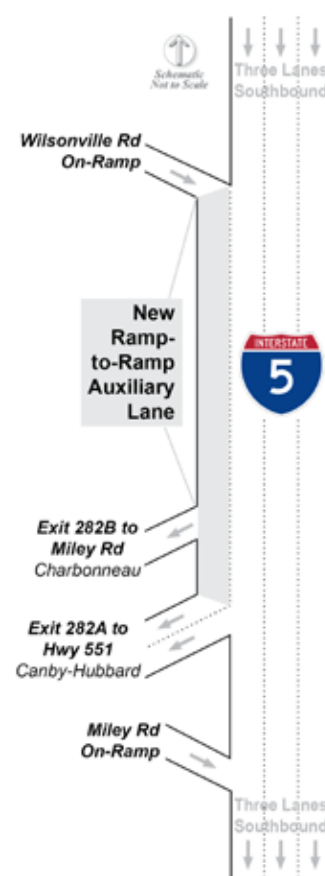
- **Option A:** New lane from Wilsonville Rd to Charbonneau exit
- **Option B:** New lane extended south to Canby-Hubbard exit
- **Option C:** same as B, plus a second turn lane added to the Canby-Hubbard off-ramp

All three options would improve mobility; generally, the longer the lane, the greater the benefit. Cost difference among the three options is small, as the project cost and potential environmental impact comes primarily from the Boone Bridge seismic improvements (which are the same for all three options).

Recent traffic flow analysis suggests that about 60 percent of all traffic entering I-5 at Wilsonville Rd. exits at either the Charbonneau or Canby-Hubbard exits.

After the March 14 open house, the project team will consider community input, prepare its recommendation and open a 45-day comment period on or about April 1. City adoption of the preferred option is anticipated in May, with State approval this summer.

OPTION C

The City's preferred Option C is a ramp-to-ramp (auxiliary) lane concept that includes a new lane extending south from Wilsonville Rd. to Canby-Hubbard exit, and includes a second exit lane.

French Prairie Bridge Project Enters Environmental Review

The French Prairie Bridge Project, Wilsonville's proposed bicycle/pedestrian/emergency-access bridge across the Willamette River, has been earmarked for an environmental assessment review.

This step, approved by the U.S. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), studies the project's environmental impacts and will deliver a clearer picture of project impacts before design and construction begin.

During this assessment, project leaders will continue to zero in on preferred bridge type and location. The site being considered is near the site of the historic Boones Ferry—west of the I-5 Boone Bridge, and east of the railroad bridge.

The French Prairie Bridge would fill a critical gap in Wilsonville's transportation infrastructure, connecting the Portland metro area and the northern portion of the Willamette Valley for cyclists and pedestrians, and providing an alternative to I-5 for emergency vehicles.

Community planners have sought a safe bicycle and pedestrian crossing of the Willamette River for more than two decades. This bridge would provide resident commuters who live south of the river with an alternative to I-5, and also provide new recreation opportunities by connecting the Ice Age Tonquin Trail with the Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway.

The City of Wilsonville is continuing to advance this project, which will support safer commuting, improve emergency response times, enhance economic development and provide recreational value.

Community members with an interest in helping Wilsonville realize this needed amenity are encouraged to attend the Task Force Meeting on April 12 to share their thoughts and review potential locations.

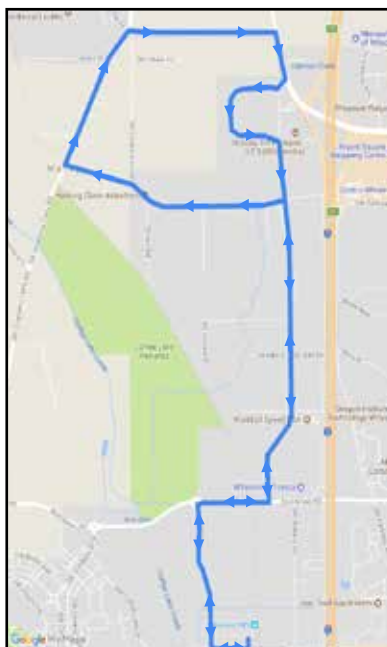
When he's not behind the wheel of a SMART bus, you can find Josh with friends and family outdoors fishing, camping, and walking Oregon's beaches.

Two TVF&R Annexation Measures Appear on March 13 Election Ballot

Measures 34-280 and 34-281 Would Allow Newberg and Rural Area to Join Fire District

Wilsonville voters are to be asked in the March 13 special election to consider whether to allow annexation of the City of Newberg and Newberg Rural Fire Protection District territories into Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's service area.

Approval of Measures 34-280 and 34-281 does not increase taxes paid by existing TVF&R residents. Because property owners in Newberg and the surrounding rural area would pay the same rate upon annexation as existing TVF&R patrons, the tax rate paid on bonded debt could actually decrease across TVF&R's entire service area.

Since July 1, 2016, TVF&R has provided fire protection, emergency medical and ambulance transport services to the city of Newberg and surrounding rural area under a two-year contract. Voters residing in both the City of Newberg and Newberg Rural areas voted in favor of annexation to TVF&R in the November 2017 election, with 69 percent voter support in the city and 63 percent voter approval in the rural area.

Oregon law allows 100 or more existing TVF&R voters to file petitions with Washington County dur-

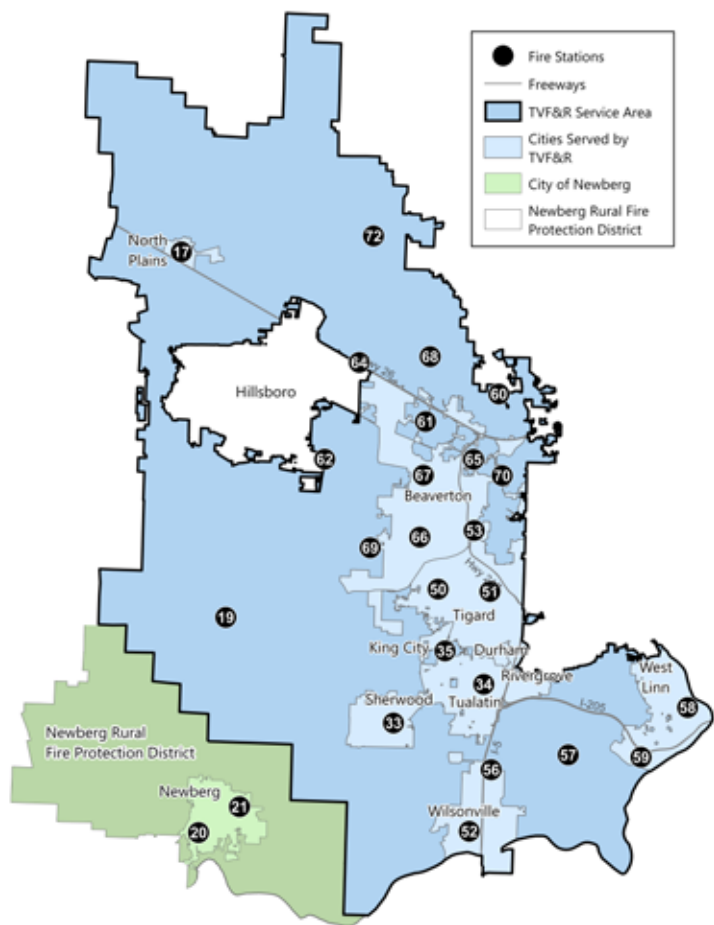
ing the annexation process to request an in-district election on the proposed annexations. In December, petitions were filed and accepted by the Washington County board.

Since then, TVF&R has placed Measures 34-280 (city) and 34-281 (rural) on the March ballot. If voters pass both Measures 34-280 and 34-281, TVF&R then finalizes the annexation process. The City of Newberg and Newberg Rural Fire Protection District would then permanently join TVF&R on July 1, 2018. Property owners in the city of Newberg and Newberg Rural would pay the same tax rate as existing TVF&R property taxpayers.

If either or both measures do not pass, TVF&R plans to work with Newberg and/or the rural district to ensure an effective transition, whether TVF&R continues to provide service through a contract extension or if Newberg reverts to

the former model of service provision.

Improved ISO Rating Awarded to Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue

May Lower Insurance Premiums

The Insurance Services Office (ISO) helps establish industry standards used by most insurance companies to determine fire premiums.

ISO recently improved Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's rating after comprehensive analysis of the district's fire protection and prevention capabilities.



"We are so pleased with our improved rating. It has the potential to save the people we serve money on their insurance premiums," said Fire Chief Mike Duyck.

Property owners in TVF&R's service area should talk with their insurance provider to determine which rate is applied to their property.

- On a 10-point scale (Class 1 being the highest), TVF&R is rated a Class 2 in all areas within five miles of a fire station.
- Properties located more than five miles from a fire station are considered a Class 10.
- Some properties located 5-7 miles from a fire station might be considered a Class 10w, depending on the features of the property, giving customers a 5 to 10 percent discount.

Currently, there are no Class 1 departments in Oregon. TVF&R is among the top 3 percent of the 46,042 fire departments evaluated by ISO.

TVF&R is among the top 3 percent of the 46,042 fire departments evaluated by ISO.

ISO considered staffing, equipment, training, fire station distribution, incident reporting, data collection and community-risk-reduction efforts. They also evaluated water infrastructure, shuttling abilities and emergency communications.

Washington County Consolidated Communications Agency, the 911 dispatch center, earned the highest marks possible in all categories, and TVF&R's fire prevention and community-risk-reduction programs earned the highest marks in Oregon to date.

Meridian Creek MS Hosts Area's First Joint Rotary Club Meeting

Meridian Creek Middle School hosted a special occasion on January 31—the first-ever joint meeting for West Linn and Wilsonville Rotary Clubs.

About 25 members from each organization met for lunch, performances from the school's advanced choir and orchestra, and a tour of the new school. Students showed Rotarians a few of their favorite spots while demonstrating the learning that takes place every day.

The Rotarians got an education, too. A presentation from West Linn-Wilsonville School District Superintendent Kathy Ludwig offered a sneak peek into the District's High School Study Group, which is in the midst of conducting research around future high school options as the District continues to grow.

"People are choosing to move to these two cities for the communities and the schools," Ludwig said. "We're proud of that fact and excited to work together into the future."

Ludwig thanked both groups for the work they do to improve their communities.

West Linn, Wilsonville Post State's Top Graduation Rates

West Linn-Wilsonville School District has earned an A+ from the State of Oregon.

When 2016-17 high school graduation rates were released in January by the Oregon Department of Education, West Linn High School ranked #1 in Oregon at 97.19 percent; Wilsonville High School was a close second at 96.25 percent.

"There are a lot of factors that go into graduation rates, but a great deal of the credit goes to our students," said Superintendent Kathy Ludwig.

The District improved almost across the board at all of its schools, generating an overall graduation rate of 93.04 percent.

"We're fortunate to live in a community that cares about its schools, providing many resources and opportunities for our students to succeed," Ludwig said. "And of course we have tremendous teachers and administrators, all who play a pivotal role in the academic successes of our students."

Statewide, the graduation rate increased two percentage points to 77 percent, showing an upward trajectory over the past five years.

West Linn-Wilsonville improved in graduation

rate for economically disadvantaged students (83.44 percent) and students with disabilities (79.17 percent).

"There are a lot of factors that go into graduation rates, but a great deal of the credit goes to our students."

"Goal No. 1 is to grow student achievement, generate equitable outcomes for all students, and eliminate

opportunity and achievement gaps," Ludwig said. "In that spirit, it truly is our goal to achieve a graduation rate of 100 percent, and ensure that our students are college and career ready when they leave our buildings."

Willamette Water Supply Program to Yield Seismically Resilient Supply Segment of Project's Pipeline to be Installed in Conjunction with Kinsman St. Extension

The Willamette Water Supply Program (WWSP) is coordinating with the City of Wilsonville to install a water pipeline during construction of the 5th Street to Kinsman Road Extension Project.

This section of the pipeline extends north under Wilsonville Road and Kinsman Road, terminating for now just north of the Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue station.

Simultaneous construction of road and WWSP pipeline saves money and minimizes disruption to the public by sharing some common costs, such as contractor mobilization, traffic control, permitting and project design than if performed separately.

Construction for the road and pipeline project is planned to begin in the summer of 2018, with completion anticipated in 2019.

This project is the second recent collaboration between Wilsonville and the WSSP; last year, the project to extend SW Kinsman Road to Boeckman Road included the installation of a half-mile pipeline segment.

Eventually, by 2026, a 30-mile underground pipeline will extend north from Wilsonville's Willamette River Water Treatment Plant (WRWTP) all the way to Hillsboro to support a regional infrastructure that helps water system operators balance supply during drought or other interruptions, and recover more quickly after a large natural disaster. About three miles of pipeline will be installed in Wilsonville.

The Willamette Water Supply System, to develop a seismically resilient water supply, is funded by Tualatin Valley Water District and the City of Hillsboro.

The Program includes construction of a new water treatment plant in unincorporated Washington County.

The new plant is designed to utilize similar processes as the existing WRWTP, which has been delivering safe and reliable water to Wilsonville and Sherwood residents since April 2002.

The 5th Street to Kinsman Road extension project

extends 5th Street west to intersect with Kinsman Road, which is being extended south from Wilsonville Road. The project also includes extension of the Ice Age Tonquin Trail 2,000 feet to connect with Boones Ferry Road and a re-design of Boones Ferry Road between Bailey and 5th Street.

On Tuesday, April 10, the City of Wilsonville is holding an open house at City Hall, 5-6:30 pm. Project

engineers are sharing design plans and soliciting public comment on the proposed 5th Street to Kinsman Road extension. This meeting represents the last opportunity for public comment on the design of this project.

Reports from City Boards and Commissions

City Council Approves Innovative Development Code for Coffee Creek Industrial Area and Agreement to Support Regional Water Treatment Plan

At the Feb. 5 City Council meeting, the Council approved on first reading new form-based code standards for businesses locating at the new Coffee Creek Industrial Area. This innovative building code—believed to be a first in the United States for industrial development—sets clear and objective standards for new development. These standards are designed to allow developers to build connected, campus-like designs and to facilitate efficient, expedited City review of proposals that provide developers with greater certainty and more flexibility. The new form-based code standards and review process are subject to a pilot period of three completed development applications or five years to allow the City to evaluate results of using the new code. Developers may still elect to submit custom plans that undergo the standard development-review process.

The Council adopted on first reading an intergovernmental agreement among Tualatin Valley Water District and cities of Wilsonville, Hillsboro, Sherwood, Beaverton, and Tigard to form the Willamette Intake Facilities Commission. This new commission is to jointly own, operate, utilize and pay for Willamette River water-intake facilities, including the existing Wilsonville intake and a new facility funded by Tualatin Valley Water District and the City of Hillsboro (see page 5).

Because of other agreements negotiated relating to the intake facilities as well as Wilsonville's prior investments in the existing intake facility, the agreement stipulates that Wilsonville spends significantly less on improvements and permitting than the other parties and caps Wilsonville's costs.

During citizen input, the Council heard from 28 citizens regarding Oregon House Bills 4099 and 4138, two bills that could impact recreational boating/wakeboarding on the Willamette River. One of the bill's sponsors, Rep. Rich Vial, spoke and said that a compromise amendment could be introduced to allow

lawmakers additional time to address the issues.

Under Mayor's Business, the Council approved a two-year contract through November 2019 for City Attorney Barbara Jacobson, who was praised by Council members for her high-quality legal advice and work product. The Council also confirmed the appointment of several volunteers to City boards and commissions, including:

- Appointment of William Amadon to Budget Committee for a term from Feb. 5, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2020.
- Appointment of Ronald Heberlein to Planning Commission for a term from Feb. 5, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2021.
- Appointment Shanti Villarreal and Tracy Meyer to the Development Review. Staff were given authority to assign and move members between panels A and B.
- Appointment of David Davis to Community Enhancement Committee Position 1 to fill an unexpired term until June 30, 2020.
- Appointment of Amanda Johnson to Community Enhancement Committee Position 2 to fill an unexpired term until June 30, 2020.
- Appointment of Purity Case to Community Enhancement Committee Position 3 to fill an unexpired term until June 30, 2021.

Under City Manager's Business, Bryan Cosgrove introduced Bill Evans, the City's incoming Communications and Marketing Manager (see page 7).

During work session prior to the meeting, Council discussed the contract renewal of City Attorney Barbara Jacobson and heard reports from City staff, including an update on a proposed new parking lot at Memorial Park that would accommodate visitors to the community garden and relocated dog park and on two new road construction projects, Fifth Street to Kinsman Road and Tooze/Boeckman Road intersection area.

City Council Approves Annexing and Taking Ownership of County Roadway, and Authorizes Right-of-Way Acquisition

During the Jan. 18 Wilsonville City Council meeting, the Council took three major steps simultaneously to advance preparations for development of the Portland-metro regionally significant Coffee Creek industrial area of high-wage employers in Wilsonville.

The Council approved on second reading the annexation into City limits of 4.9 acres of roadway located in the northwest industrial area of Wilsonville. Approximately one mile of existing rural and unimproved county roads were annexed, including Garden Acres Road, Cahalin Road and Clutter Street.

In conjunction with annexing the existing roadway, the Council adopted a resolution seeking to transfer the road authority from Washington County to the City, which would then take ownership of the roads for improvements.

The Council also authorized the acquisition of approximately 102,000 square feet or 2.3 acres of right-of-way and easements from 14 property owners on 34 separate tax-lots that border Garden Acres Road, which stretches a half-mile from Ridder Road north to near Day Road.

Finally, the Council renewed a five-year intergovernmental agreement between the City and other local and state governmental agencies that are members of the Oregon Public Works Emergency Response Cooperative Assistant program. The City's participation in the program formalizes the exchange of equipment, supplies and personnel among government agencies during emergency response or recovery efforts.

Under Mayor's Business, the Council confirmed the reappointment of several volunteers to City boards and commissions, including:

- Reappointment of Arthur Park to Budget Committee for a second term from Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2020.
- Reappointment of Gerald Greenfield to Planning Commission for a second term from Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2021.

- Reappointment of Fred Ruby to Development Review Board Panel A for a second term from Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2019.
- Reappointment of Samy Nada to Development Review Board Panel B for a second term from Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2019.

Under City Manager's Business, the Council approved sending a letter to Oregon legislative leaders opposing potential legislation in the "short" February session of the legislature that would remove public-review processes to allow the Oregon Dept. of Aviation to 'supersite' an extension of the Aurora State Airport runway in Marion County. The Council directed staff to work with Clackamas County to oppose legislation that preempts public participation in the land-use process and results in increased urban-level activity in a rural location lacking municipal governance, adequate infrastructure and surface-transportation facilities.

During Communications, the Council heard an update from Nina Carlson, Government & Community Affairs Consultant, of NW Natural describe the utility's efforts to move to a "low-carbon future" that reduces overall carbon-emissions by 2035.

During work session prior to the meeting, Council heard a number of reports from City staff. Public Works Director Delora Kerber presented a recently completed inventory of street trees in the city that showed 24,208 trees of 274 different species border 79 miles of Wilsonville roadways; the tree inventory will help the City to better manage and plan for the selection of trees in the future. Finance Director Susan Cole and Police Chief Rob Wurpes presented on the costs and benefits of various scenarios for the use of "red-light cameras" to capture driver violations of traffic-control devices. The Council decided to pause this initiative to install red-light cameras since a new traffic law-enforcement officer is scheduled to start in March that may result in decreased traffic infractions that impact public safety and traffic flow.

Budget Committee Set To Tackle 2018-19 FY Work Plan

The City of Wilsonville Budget Committee plans to meet on a number of occasions in 2018 to review City financial information and review and approve a budget for Council adoption. All meetings are to be held at Wilsonville City Hall, 29799 SW Town Center Loop East.

The Budget Committee is holding two meetings prior to conducting a public hearing to hear from City staff on a number of issues that may impact the City budget now and in the future:

Thursday, Mar. 8, 6 pm: The Budget Committee is scheduled to review the City's financial status for the current fiscal year

Wednesday, May 30, 6-9 pm: The Budget Committee convenes for the initial meeting to review the City's Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19. The Committee is scheduled to take public testimony and consider various aspects of the City's annual budget.

Wednesday, June 6, 6-9 pm: The second Budget Committee meeting to review the City's annual budget. At this meeting, the budget of the City's Urban Renewal Agency will also be considered. The public has the opportunity to address the Committee, either regarding the City's budget or that of the Urban Renewal Agency. The Budget Committee may approve at this meeting a recommended budget for City Council adoption, which is scheduled for June 18.

Thursday, June 7, 6-9 pm (tentative): A third Budget Committee meeting is tentatively scheduled to review the City's annual budget for FY 2018-19. Often, the Budget Committee completes the review and approval process in two meetings.

Once approved by the Budget Committee, the budget is forwarded to the City Council for a public hearing and potential adoption on June 18, 7 pm.

Library Board Provides Demolition Update, Announces Foundation Officers

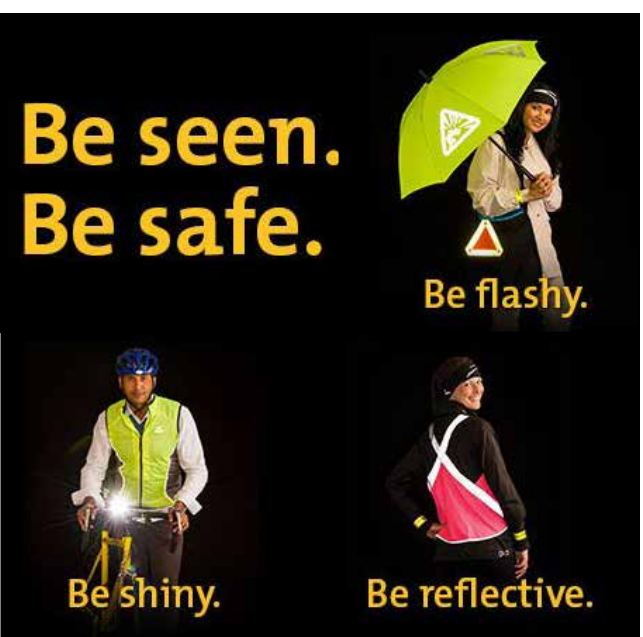
During the February meeting of the Library Board, members observed the Library's 36th anniversary on Valentine's Day.
