Solid Waste Franchise Operating Margin Rate Review Results Summary

- 2018: 15.1% actual
- 2019: 18.4% inflated in part by incorrect commercial recycling-surcharge rate
- 2020: 12.9% assuming status quo with no service/ rate modifications
- 2020: 10.0% assuming implementation of staff recommendation for new recycling services, City street sweepings and recycling-surcharge rate reduction



Temporary Recycling Surcharge

- Commercial customer per-yard surcharge was applied to all collected yards, using the Clackamas County methodology.
- Surcharge approved by City Council was customer's solid waste container size multiplied by \$1.50.
- Customer was invoiced \$51.96 (8 yards x \$1.50 x 4.33 pickups per month) 4.33 higher than intended or \$161,673 total for refund/credit.

Temporary Recycling-Surcharge 50% Rate Reduction

- Residential: \$1.25/month reduction
- Commercial: correct assessment method;
 \$0.75/yard/number of pick-ups per week
- Surcharge modification start Jan. 1, 2020



- Residential Food Waste Program: Allow food scraps to be collected with yard debris.
 - \$21,521 cost
 - Could start in Q2 2020



New Service Improvements

2. Bulky Waste Pick-up for ADA/Senior Citizens

- 250 pick-ups each estimated at \$40
- \$10,000 cost
- Could start in Q1 2020



- 3. Styrofoam Collection / Recycling
 - Styrofoam collection station at WRI for residents and businesses
 - Pilot program to evaluate demand
 - \$10,000 cost
 - Could start in Q1 2020



- 4. Commercial / Industrial Fluorescent Tubes / Batteries Box Mail-Back Service
 - Limited duration "recycling box mail-back" service for 48" fluorescent tubes and batteries
 - \$15,000 cost
 - Could start in Q1 2020



- 5. Commercial Food Waste Program
 - Mandated by Metro; City Council enacted July 2019 to start July 2020
 - \$7,752 cost
 - Scheduled to start in Q1 2020 for Group 1 largest food-scrap producers



- 6. Public Works Street-Sweepings and Leaf Collection and Disposal
 - Arrangements being made to use Republic Services' WRI facility for DEQ-permitted streetsweepings
 - Est. \$75,000 cost
 - \$100,000 City budget savings

Net Reduction by 2.9 Percentage Points for 10% Target Operating Margin



50% Across-the-Board Reduction to the Temporary Recycling-Surcharge Rate

- **Residential** reduce from \$2.50/mo. to \$1.25
- **Commercial** correcting surcharge and cut in half

Net Reduction by 1.8 Percentage Points for 10% Target Operating Margin



Projected Results in 2020

2020: 12.9% assuming status quo with no service/ rate modifications.
2020: 10.0% assuming implementation of staff recommendation for new recycling services, City Public Works street-sweepings and recyclingsurcharge rate reduction.
