2020 Rate Review Process Background

- Complete tests of reported revenues and expense to determine if the reported amounts are reasonable compared to the reported operations.
- 2019 adjusted results summarized in table.



Projected Results for 2020

Factors:

- **2020 Rate Decrease:** January 1, 2020, City Council approved rate decrease for the recycling surcharge for cart service (\$1.25 per customer per month) and commercial (\$0.75 per yard).
- **COVID:** Commercial Revenue estimated to decrease by 4% due to statewide lockdown
- Personnel Operational Expense Increase: Driver wage increase of 2% and health insurance for union and non-union employees increased by 4.35%.
- Metro Tipping Fee Increase: Disposal increased by \$0.90 per ton effective July 1, 2020, of the Metro excise tax.



Projected Results for 2020

Factors:

- Inflation increased by 2.11% June 2019–June 2020; doubled to 4.08% for 2021. Management/labor costs to increase by 2.0%.
- City Franchise Fees Increase by two percentage points from 3% to standard 5%, a 40% increase when compared to 2019.
- New Oregon Corporate Activity Tax (CAT) effective January 1, 2020. Composite tax rate for waste and recycling services within the Portland region is calculated at 0.50% of total revenue, for an estimated expense of \$35,700.

Solid Waste Franchise – Operating Margin

- Margin range of 8% to 12%, with target of 10%.
- Projected 11.3% is within range and over target.

• No rate change recommended at this time.



Solid Waste Disposal Potential New 2021 Costs

Metro Regional System Fee (RSF):

- Metro proposing a 14% increase (+\$2.65/ton) of the RSF from \$18.58 to \$21.23 per ton effective January 1, 2021.
- Another potential increase effective July 1, 2021.



Solid Waste Disposal Potential New 2021 Costs

Metro Allocations to Private Transfer Stations:

- Current allocation of tonnages to Metro public transfer stations is 40%.
- Metro waste volumes fell below 40%, therefore, Metro decreased the tonnage allocations to four private transfer stations, including WRI.
- WRI's volume was reduced by 5.1%, which could increase the tipping fee charged to Wilsonville.



- 1. Residential Food Waste Collection
- 2. Bulky Waste Pick-up for ADA/Senior Citizens
- 3. Residential/Commercial Polystyrene Collection Station
- 4. Commercial Fluorescent Tube/Battery Recycling
- 5. Commercial Food Waste Program (Metro mandatory)



Residential Food Waste Collection

- Allows food scraps to be collected with yard debris.
- Commenced February 2020.
- City Council approved Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Program grant request for free distribution of 500 compost pails during 2021 to further encourage residential participation.



Bulky Waste Pick-up for ADA/Senior Citizens

- Limited duration program of free bulky waste pickup at residence of ADA/Senior Citizens.
- Started in February, suspended in March due to Covid pandemic, resumed in July.
- 46 pick-ups completed to-date.



Residential/Commercial Polystyrene Collection Station

- Free drop-off of bagged polystyrene block foam (not "peanuts").
- Opened in February.
- Good utilization; however, 26% contamination rate.
- City to help promote better disposal practices.



Commercial Fluorescent Tube/Battery Recycling

- Limited duration program for distribution of free mail-back boxes for businesses.
- City Ec-Dev and County Sustainability marketing lead; program suspended in March due to Covid-19.
- City-County regrouping on new outreach protocols.
- Republic Services acquired boxes on-site.



Commercial Food Waste Program (Metro mandatory)

- Three-year phased-in Metro program with County Sustainability in lead locally.
- Implementation of Phase 1 with largest food-waste generators delayed by Metro one year to March 2021 due to Covid-19 pandemic.



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
